Tonight, March 13th and 14th, 2020 is 26 years ago Sister Lucille Hill began this women's workshop. 26 years later it's still fresh and needed.

Genesis 2:18-25 NIV

The LORD God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him." ¹⁹Now the LORD God had formed out of the ground all the wild animals and all the birds in the sky. He brought them to the man to see what he would name them; and whatever the man called each living creature, that was its name. ²⁰So the man gave names to all the livestock, the birds in the sky and all the wild animals. But for Adam no suitable helper was found. ²¹So the LORD God caused the man to fall into a deep sleep; and while he was sleeping, he took one of the man's ribs and then closed up the place with flesh. ²²Then the LORD God made a woman from the rib he had taken out of the man, and he brought her to the man. ²³The man said, "This is now bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called 'woman,' for she was taken out of man." ²⁴That is why a man leaves his father and mother and is united to his wife, and they become one flesh. ²⁵Adam and his wife were both naked, and they felt no shame.

As we look at the cost and need to improve and strengthen male-female relationships that are struggling with emotional pain; we must identify these relational problems. I'm going to challenge us about restructuring your thought process that affect behavior and relationship dynamics. Such as stubbornness, unfaithfulness, full of ourselves, conceitedness, irresponsibleness, noncommittal and unable to communicate. I will attempt to define some concrete and workable solutions.

Allow me to suggest that the root problem with human relationships is that we have deviated from God's order and design for relationships. From the beginning the word says: "It's not good for man to be alone". This suggest that God is aware of our basic need for a partner and that He is the one who arranged for the "suitable" mate. SO MAN NEEDED COMPANIONSHIP. He needs a suitable partner; a women! Once the marriage takes place there must be room for growth and development; because shortly after the wedding most of us begin to see faults and shortcomings. Now some serious communication must begin. If not; anger, hostility, and hurt feelings develops. If rational needs are not met look out!

The need for companionship in a long lasting relationship is so strong that most men and women will go to any length to satisfy it. So why focus on rational needs? What is the benefit of sharing rational needs? When we improve, strengthen and increase positive communication about rational needs; (wants and desires) this strengthens the relationship. Sharing those rational needs is a priceless treasure. When you share a rational need you share a deep part of yourself. It increases understanding. It promotes action in the relationship. Once you know your mate's needs, you can act upon that knowledge. As you gain the right knowledge and take

action you promote security, and trust in the relationship. Conflict is inevitable, but if rational needs are getting met, then the conflict usually does not grow as intense and it gets resolved faster. When rational needs are being met it increases honor in the relationship. Needs and wants are important! If you try hard to understand rational needs you can look forward to a long lasting relationship.

High on the list of rational needs lies the need for physical touch. Look for ways to add touch to your relationship. Hug for no reason except that it is most important. Most people don't know how to hug! There is no affection and warmth in it. It's cold and stiff. It's like hugging a tree. No life in it. So learn how to touch! Learn how to hug! Let me move on.

While the Bible is not an explicit sex manual, it does set forth at least six principles regarding sex and sexuality. Sex and sexuality are positive creations of God. Genesis 1:27 KIV and NIV 1:31 indicates that God created male and female as distinct beings. Genesis 2:25 NIV, says after the creation of them "both"; God felt very good about these creations.

One role in sexual relation is procreation. Adam knew Eve his wife, and she conceived, however, sex has a greater role than procreation. It is also intended for pleasure. *Proverbs 5:18-19^{KJV}* points this out. Let thy fountain be blessed and rejoice with the wife of thy youth. Let her be as the loving kind and pleasant roe; let her breast satisfy thee at all times, and be thou ravished always with her love.

The Song of Solomon cannot be read without clearly seeing the positive and enjoyable expressions of romantic love. 1 Corinthians 7:1-5 NIV, outlines the mutual responsibility for sexual enjoyment of husband and wife. Yes; talking, touching, extended foreplay, after play, feeling loved outside the bedroom, being allowed

to be the initiator, being cuddled, held, romanced before and after love making, thus eliminating the feeling of being a "receptacle" or having to participated in a "Bam bam, thank you ma'am" brand of sex.
